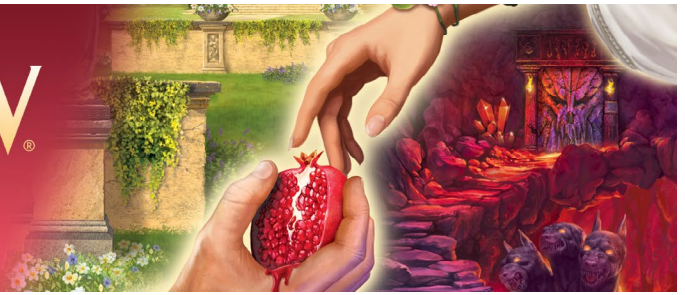

The following are ideas for learning while playing that the HeR Interactive team hopes will **encourage discussions** and **offer points of learning** in the **listed subject areas**.

In addition to this subject overview, we have created a **worksheet** with **questions for students to complete while playing the game** for added learning and engagement.

Subjects that tie in with facts and themes in the game:

Greek mythology, Greek art and alphabet, literature, science, and history.

Greek Mythology

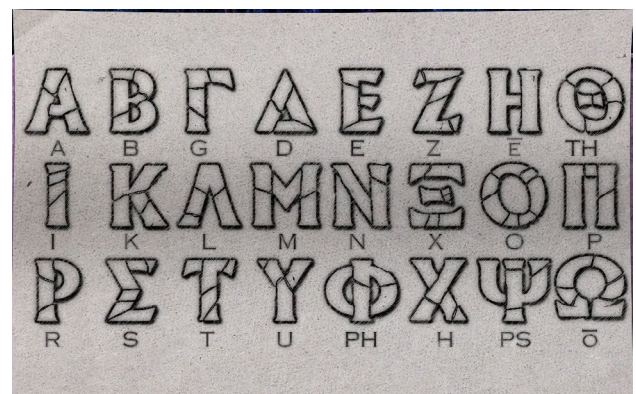
Learn about the ancient Greek mythology and its rich cast of characters and stories! Learn how they each have a Roman name and which characters were named after planets in our solar system.

Greek Art and Alphabet

Learn the Greek alphabet and spell out the character's names. Explore the different kinds of Greek artwork, from pantheons and the names for each of its elements, to sculptures and paintings, vases and jewelry.

Literature

Explore the myth of Persephone and Hades, with the sets and stages designed after each environment in their story.




Science

Use a spectroscope to examine jewelry and its authenticity. With permission from a family member – have the student try one of the many methods shown in the game (Melina's computer has an authentication guide) to checking authenticity of real or fake jewelry.

History

Consider visiting a local museum with your student, just like the game, to learn more about Greek history, culture, and mythology.

1. Signed statement of authenticity from a proven authority or expert
2. Statement from the artist of the pieces
3. Gallery sales receipt
4. Names of the previous owners and dates of ownership

5. Exhibition or gallery sticker or stamp on the art

6. Published documents on the piece

7. Gallery catalogs showcasing the piece

8. Provenance must include a description and/or image of the piece

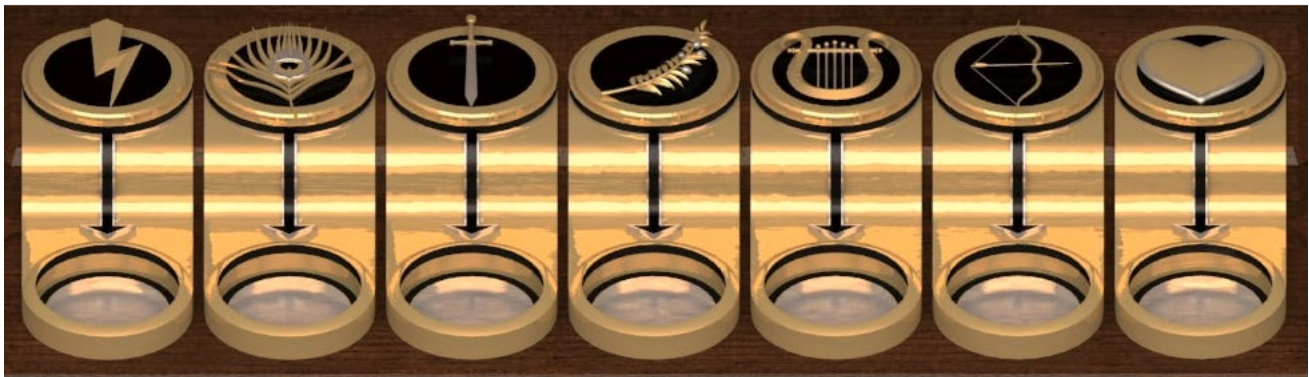
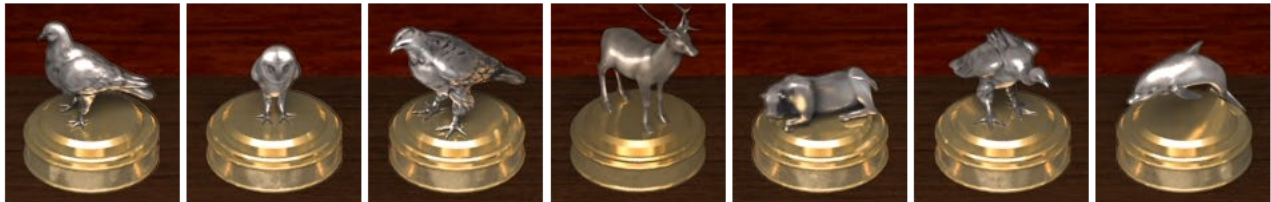
A: Fake = Black. Real = Gold.

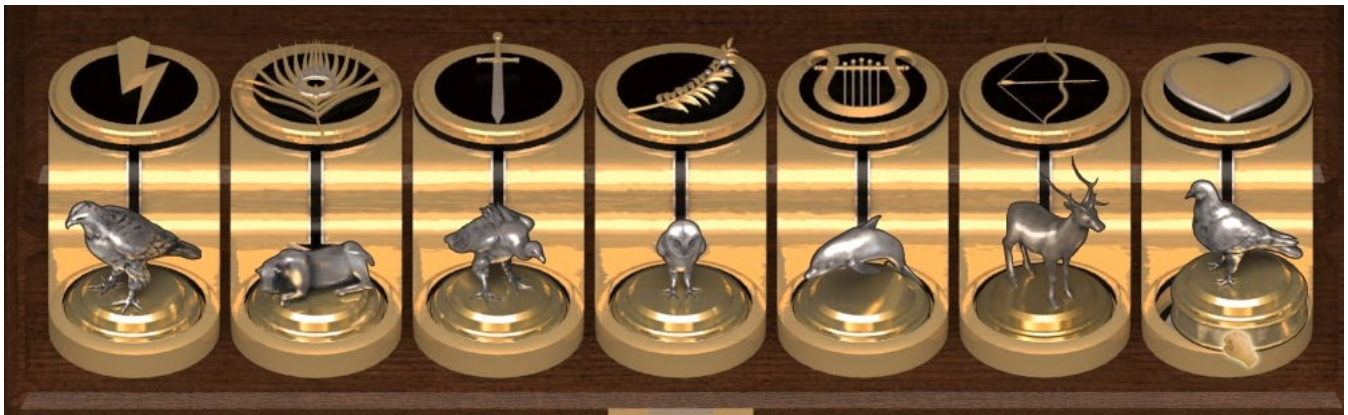
